MISSION STATEMENT

The Health Department shall be responsive to the community health needs of the citizens of County by continually and diligently endeavoring to prevent disease, prolong life and promote public health.



The Kent County Health Department (KCHD) has been in the business of providing public health services to Kent County since 1931. The Health Department is made up of four divisions: Administration, Community Clinical Services, Community Nursing, and Environmental Health. KCHD is home to nearly 260 employees including public health nurses, sanitarians, health educators, technicians, clerks and public health administrators. The Health Department operates five satellite clinics located in Wyoming, Kentwood, Rockford, and **TWO** within the City of Grand Rapids.

ADMINISTRATION

The Administration Division is responsible for the overall administration of the Health Department and provides support in planning, evaluation, disease control, contract management, data processing, financial management and community education. Administration includes:

- Communicable Disease/Epidemiology (CD/Epi)
- Emergency Preparedness
- Finance
- Healthy Kent 2010
- Management Information Systems
- Health Care for People of Color
- Health Education and Promotion
- Obesity Initiative
- · Medical Examiner

The Health Education and Promotion unit provided educational programming in **95** schools in Kent County. They also provided programs at local churches, community centers, juvenile detention centers and the Kent County Jail.

The Communicable Disease and Epidemiology unit at the Kent County Health Department monitors the occurrence of specific diseases on a community-wide basis. In 2006, the CD/EPI unit conducted investigations into 14,828 cases of reportable disease.



1,110 individuals were screened during Blood Pressure and Cholesterol screenings at community worksites.

KCHD launched a seasonal flu campaign in November. The "Secret Weapons" campaign aired on **three** local television networks, **eight** radio stations and **30** billboards. Flu "Survival Kits" were distributed to **5,000** residents and **2,500** Kent County employees.

COMMUNITY CLINICAL SERVICES

Community Clinical Services provides clinic-based prevention programs to the citizens of Kent County. Services include:

- Personal Health Services
- Women, Infants and Children (WIC)
- International Travel Immunizations Clinic
- Public Health Nurse Counseling Services
- Pregnancy Testing
- Head Lice Assessment and Treatment
- Immunizations

Women, Infants and Children (WIC) is a supplemental nutrition program funded by the United States Department of Agriculture for low and moderate income pregnant, breastfeeding, and postpartum women, infants, and children up to age five who are at nutritional risk. KCHD conducted **75,958 WIC** appointments in 2006.

Personal Health Services administered testing and education to **7,018** clients for Sexually Transmitted Infections

KCHD's Childhood Immunization program administered vaccines to **17,609** clients.



KCHD's International Travel Immunizations Clinic administers vaccines that provide protection from diseases found in other parts of the world. The Travel Clinic performed **2,993** client visits.

COMMUNITY NURSING

This division is the focal point of delivery of community-based field services for the Department. These services include:

- Maternal and Infant Health Program (MIHP)
- Healthy Start
- Early On
- Children's Special Health Care Services (CSHCS)
- Child Death Review Counseling
- Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention
- Refugee Health Services
- Vision and Hearing Screening
- Nurse Family Partnership

The Kent County Health Department is the largest of five certified Maternal and Infant Health Program (MIHP) providers offering in-home services to pregnant women and families with infants in Kent County. In 2006, 20,664 MIHP visits were conducted by KCHD employees.

The Children's Special Health Care Services Program (CSHCS) added 336 new clients bringing their total enrollment to 2,116.

The Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program provides surveillance, case management and lead hazard education and remediation for all children tested for lead poisoning. The program identified 233 children under the age of *SiX* that were victims of lead poisoning in 2006 and served more than 375 families.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Environmental factors pertaining to food, land, water and shelter may pose risks to human health when not protected from potential contamination. The Environmental Health Division works to prevent illness caused by interactions between people and the environment. Services include:

- Child Care/Adult Foster Care Facility Inspections
- Food Service Sanitation
- Housing Program
- Laboratory Services
- Vacant Land Evaluations
- Nuisance Control Program
- Private Water Supply Inspections/Sanitary Facility Evaluation
- Public Swimming Pool Inspections
- Public Water Supply Permits
- Sewage Disposal System Regulation






