

Leftover medications  
are a threat to  
everyone.



*Keeping unused, unwanted or expired medications can pose a risk to you and the children in your care and contribute to unintentional poisonings.*

Safely dispose of unwanted or expired over-the-counter and prescription medications by taking them to a participating pharmacy.

Items accepted include:

- Cold and flu medications
- Antibiotics/steroids
- Medication samples
- Non-controlled prescription medications
- Vitamins/herbal supplements
- Pet medications
- Medicated ointments/lotions

*Narcotic pain killers and prescribed, controlled medications (e.g. Codeine, Ritalin, Xanax, Ambien, Vicodin, etc.) **must** be taken to a local law enforcement agency.*

*Certain restrictions may apply at any of the drop off locations. Call the drop site you plan to use for more information on what items are accepted.*

## Disposal Instructions

1. Bring pills and liquids in their original containers to any participating pharmacy.
2. Block out **ALL** identifying personal information on the prescription label.
3. Do not remove the name of the medication.
4. The pharmacist must be able to see the medication type so he/she can properly sort and dispose of it.
